Medicare News

New Changes to Medicare Drug Plans for 2017

Medicare has just announced the details for the Part D prescription drug plans available for 2017. Beneficiaries can switch their plans during the Annual Enrollment Period that runs from October 15th through December 7th.

Jim Verville, Regional Coordinator for the 10 county Medicare/Medicaid Assistance Program said “as is usually the case, there will be several changes in plan offerings, premium costs, and benefit details for Medicare Part D drug plans next year.”

Following are some of the significant highlights of those changes:

- There is a marked reduction in the number of plan offerings. There will be 23 plans available for the new calendar year, or 5 fewer than approved for Michigan Medicare beneficiaries in 2016. In addition, two of the plans for 2017 are currently sanctioned by Medicare due to noncompliance issues, and may not be available at the start of next year.
- The two plans under sanction are sponsored by Cigna-HealthSpring and include their Rx Secure and Rx-Secure-Extra Part D plans. Current members are permitted to remain in these plans for 2017; however, neither are available for new enrollment until the sanction is lifted.
- Several Part D plans have an annual deductible. Medicare has authorized an increase of \$40 to a new ceiling of \$400. Normally, the deductible must be met before the plan will provide any insurance coverage for drugs.

When the full cost of medications reach \$3,700 in 2017, Medicare beneficiaries enter the “donut hole”, otherwise known as the gap. This results in significantly higher co-pays for their drugs. The donut hole will increase by \$390 next year. Those who enter the donut hole will pay 40% of the total cost of their brand name drugs and 51% of the full cost for the generic equivalents. Part D companies are required to notify their subscribers of all of these details in their Annual Notice of Change mailing. Beneficiaries should have already received this information.

While the list of plan offerings is quite extensive and confusing to navigate, there is a very helpful tool available that can be used to compare an existing drug plan with other plans available for 2017. The tool is called the Medicare Plan Finder. To do your own comparisons, or get help in finding the best plan, simply select one of the following options:

If you are comfortable doing your own research, visit the Medicare website at www.medicare.gov. Just click on the green box entitled, “Find health & drug plans,” and enter the information requested. You will be given detailed comparisons for each plan, sorted by lowest cost. Enrollment in a new plan can also be done at the same website.

A Medicare/Medicaid Specialist with the Area Agency on Aging’s Medicare/Medicaid Assistance Program (MMAP) will be available at the Government Center each Wednesday starting October 19, 2016 to offer assistance with Open Enrollment, Prescription Drug Programs, and to answer any Medicare/Medicaid questions you may have.

Leelanau County has funds from the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) for **0% interest Loans** for rehabilitation of existing homes.

These loans are available to homeowners who are at or below 80% of the Area Median Income (AMI), live in the home as their primary residence, and have repairs allowed under the program (such as new siding, insulation, windows, doors, well, septic, flooring, plumbing, roofs, electrical, etc.)

The loans can be up to \$40,000 for allowable repairs, and 50% of the loan is deferred and 50% is forgiven after residing in the home at least five (5) more years.

To find out if you qualify for a **Loan**, and for an application packet, call 231-256-9812, email housing@co.leelanau.mi.us or stop in Office Suite #108 in the Leelanau County Government Center at 8527 E. Government Center Dr., Suttons Bay (between Suttons Bay and Lake Leelanau).

Applicants must meet income guidelines and complete all required forms.

DON'T BE A VICTIM OF SCAMS AND FINANCIAL EXPLOITATION.

*A message to Leelanau County Senior Citizens from your
County Prosecutor Joseph T. Hubbell:*

Subject: SCAMS: Periodically I receive information about current scams that are occurring in the County which often target our Senior Citizens. Senior Citizens are often the target of scams because they tend to be trusting of other individuals and they often welcome the company and contact with other individuals. Most scammers are experts at reading and exploiting vulnerabilities by a number of methods including playing on a person's dreams as well as their fears. Some current and future scams which all citizens need to be aware of include;

1. Beware of buying a **flood-damaged vehicle**. Have the vehicle inspected and check the vehicle's title history. If the vehicle has been in Louisiana recently, don't buy it.
2. **Grandparent's Scam** - a person calls claiming to be a grandchild who is stranded or got into some trouble overseas. Be on guard and don't fall for the ploy. Under no circumstances should you send any money. Best advice is to hang up the telephone.
3. Reduce the risk of becoming a victim of **identity theft** by not providing any personal or financial information. Keep your financial documents and records secured, including credit cards and ATM cards. Carefully review your statements to see if you identify any suspicious activity.
4. The **Sweepstakes Scam** - you may already be a winner but there is a catch. In order to redeem your winnings you have to purchase a product or send in some money. Again, never agree to send money or provide banking or credit card information.
5. In addition, seniors are often targeted with **Health Insurance Fraud, Medicare Scams, Telemarketing Scams, and Home Repair and Contractor Fraud**. Like many scams you will be pressured to act immediately and if you don't act immediately you will miss out on the wonderful opportunity being presented because it is often characterized as a one-time opportunity. Don't be pressured to do anything. Hang up the phone, shut the door and walk away.
6. **Financial Exploitation**. As sad as it sounds, these cases more often than not involve a person you trust; a friend, caregiver or even a family member. Typically the person will present you with a song of woe involving financial troubles or a get rich quick business opportunity. Your money and property will be the target.

As with anything, if it sounds too good to be true, it is. Nothing is freely given by strangers. Use your common sense. Don't believe everything you read or what may be left on your door. By no means should you be pressured to sign or do anything. If you choose, you can take the information including the name, address, and telephone number of the person contacting you. If they refuse to provide you this information, this act alone is another clue.

When the time of year comes to pull out the traditions, add people to the dining room table, and strive to squeeze as many events into an already full calendar, it must be Christmas time. Not just Christmas, but Thanksgiving, New Years, and whatever holidays are pertinent to any family, provide an abundant time for joy . . . and stress. I know, for me, when my daughter was little, I wanted to experience as much holiday jubilee and involvement imaginable. Years of traditions begged me to teach her all the little nuances I had enjoyed. I also wanted to ignite new plans that she and I would learn to cherish.

I hear many families say, “It just wouldn’t be Christmas without . . .” Then later, recant how events did not unfold as planned, “But it was a memorable holiday any way.” So let’s consider what that means. Are there traditions or plans for your family that cause your anticipation to bring a sense of anxiety? For example, perhaps you have enjoyed having your adult children come for dinner. Then as the years transpired, they came bringing your grandchildren. Now, as the years have continued their journey, your children are now bringing their grandchildren. How nice it is to see everyone, but the noise level and hearing aids do not quite agree with each other.

Crockpot Candy

With the holidays upon us, my mind starts clicking with home made goodies for presents. Here is an easy candy recipe that makes a ton. These goodies are a must for my gift baskets. Enjoy, Armanda

Ingredients:

2 pounds of white almond bark
4 ounces German chocolate squares
12 ounce bag semisweet chocolate chips
24 ounces dry roasted peanuts



Reminder:

Some foods do not mix well with medication. Please remember to check with your doctor or pharmacist on what foods to avoid while taking certain medications.

Instructions:

Add all ingredients to slow cooker. Let cook on low for 1 hour undisturbed. After an hour, stir to combine everything. Allow to cook for another hour, stirring every 15 minutes.

Drop spoonfuls of the candy onto wax paper and allow to cool completely.

(German chocolate bar and almond bark can be found in the baking aisle of your grocery store, close to all of the baking chocolates.)

Variations: substitute any kind of nuts for peanuts, instead of semisweet chips add dark chocolate chips, sprinkle coarse sea salt while cooling on each cluster or stir in marshmallows before dropping on wax paper for a rocky road effect. The slight variations are endless.

Leelanau County Senior Services has a tradition of delivering comfort and joy to Leelanau County seniors who could use some cheer during the holiday season.



Voucher Sales *beginning January 3, 2017* *for Leelanau County Senior Residents**

DINING VOUCHERS: A limit of up to **6 vouchers** per senior will be available during the first six months of the year. You may purchase all **6 vouchers** at once. If inventory is still available beginning **July 5, 2017** we will reopen sales for up to an additional **6 vouchers** per senior while supplies last. Each dining voucher costs \$3.00 with a redeemable value of \$6.00. Total department sales of dining vouchers is limited to 4,000.
Dining vouchers expire December 31, 2017.

SNOW REMOVAL VOUCHERS: A limit of **10 snow removal** vouchers per senior household will be available for \$8.00 each with a redeemable value of \$16.00 while supplies last. You may purchase all **10 vouchers** at once. Total department sales of snow removal vouchers is limited to 3,500.
Snow removal vouchers expire December 31, 2017.

FOOT CARE VOUCHERS: A limit of **6 foot care** vouchers per senior will be available for \$10.00 each with a redeemable value of \$20.00 while supplies last. You may purchase all **6 vouchers** at once. Total department sales of foot care vouchers is limited to 1,300.
Foot Care Vouchers expire December 31, 2017.

SPECIAL EVENT VOUCHERS: Special event vouchers will only be sold to Leelanau County seniors* at \$3.00 each with a redeemable value of \$6.00. Non-resident guests may attend the events at full price.

**Unused vouchers can no longer be refunded or exchanged.
This policy has been in effect since October 1, 2013.**


